Detail, Detail, Detail

The details make the difference! This is true in architecture, couture clothing and also in quilting. Look at a stunning quilt and pay attention to such intricate details as narrow boarders, bias stripe binding, tiny appliqué or pieced components. Probably the easiest way to add detail is through the use of embellishments. Last year we witnessed the introduction of Swarovski crystal on numerous quilts. I wonder if we will see that again this year?

Those embellishments that have withstood the test of time include embroidery, beading, couching and numerous surface textures including decorative threads. Embroidery can provide wonderful intricate detail such as stamen on flowers or antenna on butterflies. Basic stitches that are most commonly used include straight stitch; stem stitch and French knots but featherstitches and thread weaving are also very effective.

Beading is another traditional technique that can add sparkle and interest. Total coverage or continuous lines are best added after piecing but before layering in order to hide the knots. My favorite beading technique is to incorporate beads into the quilting stitch. When beads blend with the fabric, colors sparkle and interest is created without overpowering the design.

Decorative thread has grown with the popularity of machine quilting. Metallic and rayon threads are now staples but variegated thread has created a revolution. Selection and use of such threads is a personal issue and highly influenced by your sewing machine personality (metallic threads continue to challenge my machine).

Select your favorite embellishment but be bold and add a variety of detail to your quilts.

NEW BUSINESS

Barbara Gilstad

The Board voted on the nomination for the Calico Rose award. Sherry Allred will receive the award for June.

The Treasurer gave her report. Judie Miller made a motion to put \$20,000 in a 2 year CD at the Jefferson State Bank. Lois seconded the motion and the motion was approved.

Mary McCarthy gave a report on the progress of the Auction committees. At the time of this meeting we had 35 quilts and 5 tops. She then reported on the Quilt Show committee progress. The raffle tickets have sold \$1,800 to date. So far 13 quilts will be entered and she stated that entries are due by July 16th.

Judie Miller gave a report of the recent visit to Saint Andrew Presbyterian Church to look at the facility for a possible change of meeting place. A motion was made by Judie to approve the plan and to take it to the members in the June meeting and ask for a vote in the July meeting. Barbara seconded the motion. A poster and photographs will be shown at the June meeting. An article will appear in the July newsletter, an e-mail about the new possible location will be sent out and a vote will be taken at the July business meeting.

OLD BUSINESS

The Board examined the contents of the safety deposit box and it was decided that the photos were to be given to the Archivist and the current President would keep the remaining documents.

The Board discussed The Donation Policy for the Guild. Corrections were made to the language of the policy and it was approved for the membership.

The Board discussed and approved the proposed Ethel Y. Howey Grant Program. If the grant program is approved by the membership, the first grant will be given in 2006 and the grant policy and application will appear in the Newsletter.

The idea of creating a banner for the guild with the new logo was discussed and the Board decided to postpone this issue until after the Quilt Show of this year.

The Board discussed photo albums that are presently kept by any members should be returned to the Guild. It was decided that a phone call would be made to these individuals to ask that all photos be returned so that they will all be in one place.

The meeting was adjourned at 6:35 p.m. Respectfully submitted,

<u>President Pro-Tem</u>: Items at the guild's contracted storage room continue to be sorted and organized. Members were reminded to contact Lois to inform her about items no longer needed.

Special Events: Volunteers are still needed for the Auction and the Boutique on June 25. Amy Cottrell announced there will be two door prizes. Tess Weaver asked for volunteers to visit her table to sign up for the September Quilt Show. Quilt entries are due by July 16. More information will be in Common Threads. Amy asked for volunteers to check vendor websites; Barbara Gilstad and Larry Beauchamp will do this.

<u>Programs</u>: Brown Bag and Christmas stockings are today's program; in July, Jan Mueller will present a program on digital photography for quilt applications. My tip is a follow-up after finishing your quilt. When making a dust ruffle to compliment your quilt, use an old, worn contour sheet as a base for the ruffle — put the sheet on the box spring (as though the spring were a mattress. Your ruffle will never slip around even if the mattress is pushed around on it. I don't even consider doing mine any other way- Dorothy in Montana

I loose track of time while sewing so I use my clock radio to pace myself. I "hit" the sleep button which will play music for one hour. When the radio shuts off I know I have to get up, stretch, look off into the distance, etc...maybe even speak to my family and put the dogs out! - Julie in New Mexico

To resharpen your rotary cutters, fold up a piece of silver foil so that you have several layers and then just cut through it several times and your cutter will be resharpened. Works great!! - Beverly in Australia

At quilt shows when you can't stand back far enough to appreciate the patterns on the larger quilts, use a door peep-hole. This lets you stand up close and see the whole quilt. You will be amazed at some of the secondary patterns that emerge. - Anne in Ontario, Canada

- 6 Any method of construction
- 7 Any material
- 8 Any color
- 9 Any design
- 10 Block contents must be in good taste as determined by Amy and Lani, the founders of the project or the current board.

MISSION

The Greater San Antonio Quilt Guild has established a grant program in honor of a loved and esteemed founding member, Ethel Y. Howey, whose accomplishments and influence extended into the international quilt world. The grant is to encourage the pursuit of education in the study of quilt making and to recognize the importance of quilting in today's society as an art form, as an instrument of healing, as part of our legacy, and as a common thread which binds all in friendship.

PURPOSE

The purpose of the grant program is to fund projects that will have long term impact on preserving the heritage and further the art of quilt making. The grant may be used to cover expenses such as fees (including conferences, workshops, etc.), travel, lodging, meals, materials and books. The grant(s) will be awarded annually, not to exceed \$1000.

ELIGIBILITY

Applicant must be an active GSAQG member in good standing for the previous two (2) years immediately preceding the grant deadline.

An applicant must show evidence of an interest in continuing to improve and innovate in the field of quilt design, construction, history or technique.

Financial need will <u>not</u> be a criterion for selection.

Recipients must be willing and able to share with GSAQG the new skills, techniques, or information gained. This may be in the form of a presentation, a workshop or other process that disseminates the information to the members.

Recipient must submit in writing a final report of the project and expenses by March 1 of the following year. If recipient fails to fulfill requirements any advanced funds must be returned.

Grant recipients are ineligible to reapply for grants for three years. Grant committee members are ineligible for grants while serving on the committee.

PROCEDURES AND DEADLINES

Applications must be submitted on or before November 1 (current year), and the grant will be awarded at the following January guild meeting. The grant recipient's final report is due by March 1 of the year **after** the grant is awarded.

The board on 6/9/05 approved the above, membership will vote on 7/9/05.


Bright Hopes

Most people operate the foot pedal of their sewing machine with their right foot only. Why? You will like using your left and right foot in turn. It doesn't take long to get used to using your left foot half the time and the alternation of feet is easier on your back. Try it and see for yourself!

Community Education Committee Chair: Betty Tope

The Community Education Committee has been an integral part of the Greater San Antonio Quilt Guild since its early years. This committee, chaired at present and for the past seven years by Betty Tope, reaches elementary aged students. Working mostly within the Northside Independent School District, its dedicated members take quilts and quilt blocks to classrooms and libraries, presenting a broad overview of the place quilts hold in American history.

On presentation day, a black cloth is put up onto which quilt blocks have been pinned. These blocks are identified and the origin of the design is told, if it is known. Finished quilts are displayed and the making of them discussed. When a child learns that a scrap quilt may have taken the

equivalent of more than ten weeks of school to complete, a greater appreciation of the art is fostered. Some children can relate the little quilts they have received from family members to the information being shared. Boys are happy to learn that men can quilt too. And mentioning the use of computers in quilt design always piques interest. As these talks take place as part of the social studies curriculum enrichment there are many questions and comments. Betty relates that after several years of fruitlessly asking 'Who knows which of the original colonies had a pine tree depicted on its flag?' she finally received the correct answer last year.

If you would like to join this committee please contact Betty Tope at (210) 696-4138. If you are shy and a bit intimidated by the thought of facing a room full of students, you can always





help in the setting up and taking down process. If you would like to "test the waters" so to speak, you may begin by presenting to the younger children. But, really, you only need remember that *you* are the intimidating one to a group of very small people. If you prefer to contribute without actually going to schools, the committee is always looking for sample blocks and finished quilts. Betty would like to have an example of quilted clothing and there is only one quilted pillow at present.

With eight hundred and seventy five service hours accumulated for the Guild last year, the Community Education Committee is an active one. Are you interested in a new meeting place??



Several people have expressed suggestions for the Services VP to go looking for other places for our monthly meetings. So she did just that!

At the June meeting Judie Miller gave a report with photos for the possible move to Saint Andrew Presbyterian Church at 8231 Callaghan Rd. This is a meeting hall, not the sanctuary, and is located just 2 tenths of a mile from the I-10 /Callaghan exit. Which means it may be more centrally located for some folks. The bus route # 602 passes by with a bus stop directly across from the church.

The hall itself is approx 50 X 100 ft. The room is bright with large windows along the entrance wall. The church has 160 chairs and long tables. I counted 12 tables. The secretary to the church said that more tables are on order. There are two large classrooms that we may use, and a lovely kitchen and coffee bar that adjoin the meeting room. We may use the kitchen for our Christmas meeting for an additional cost.



The cost to us for the use of the facility would be \$125.00 per month. We are currently paying \$100.00 per month. We would be asked to sign a 1- year contract with the church. It is possible that the church custodian would be available to help with set up and clean up after each meeting for an additional fee. There is also a nursery area available, however we would have to supply someone to staff it for our meetings.

This meeting hall has covered walkways and entrances and spacious parking available



with several handicapped parking spaces. One entrance has a drive up ramp that can be used to load and unload. The kitchen has an entrance at the back of the building with 2 parking spaces.

The only disadvantage to this meeting space is that with the windows being so large and the room so bright it would be very difficult to view slides. Several of our programs do include slides.

All members will be asked to vote on the advisability of this move at the July meeting. If you cannot attend the meeting an absentee ballot may be re-

FABRIC CHOICE AND PREPARATION

- 1. Don't be afraid to use color in your guilts.
- **2.** Pick a print that grabs your attention. Coordinate colors around that print.
- **3.** Always pick a fabric that is a little different from the others to add interest.
- 4. Choose fabrics from the same collection. They usually blend well and have a variety of lights, mediums, and darks, as well as different scales.
- **5.** Purchase extra fabric (1/4 yd. or more). You might make a mistake or need an extra strip or two. Plans for quilts change!
- **6.** When shopping for fabrics, take the pattern. Also, tack fabric samples to a 3" x 6" index card so you can find just the right fabric by comparing it to what you already have.
- 7. Wash and press fabric before cutting.
- **8.** When prewashing fabrics, clip the corner of each piece to prevent a big, tangled, spider web mess when the machine stops!

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9. To straighten fabric after washing, in preparation for cutting, fold across the bias and pull. Get a friend to help. Pull at the fold and every few inches out to the points.

QUALITY COUNTS

- 10. Get the right tools
- **11.** Use high-quality, 100% cotton fabrics.

ACCURACY MATTERS

- 12. Press as you go.
- **13.** Be sure to cut accurate templates.
- 14. Cut accurately when using the rotary cutter.
- **15.** Do whatever is necessary to achieve accurate 1/4" seams. You'll have fewer headaches!
- **16.** Learn to sew accurate strip sets.
- **17.** Be sure to square up each block before stitching them together. Square up your quilt top before adding borders.
- **18.** "From my dad, a master cabinetmaker, MEA-SURE TWICE, CUT ONCE."








Bring as many as you like with your name attached to each one. All names go in the basket and the lucky winner in the drawing gets all of the blocks.
