Program Notes


March Larry Beaucamp on "Quilts and Pictures". We'll be talking about some old and new ways of incorporating photographs and drawings in your quilts.

Community Outreach: Mary McCarthy and Sandra Retzloff organized volunteers for the Pro Show held January 19-21 and made many good contacts. The Storybooks and Quilts To Go project was presented at the Mid-Winter Conference of the American Library Association, and at a January luncheon of Kappa Kappa lota, a sorority for retired teachers.

The annual Mid-Winter conference of the American Library Association took place in San Antonio in January. Among those attending were librarians with a special interest in the Northside Independent School District Library Services. Northside was the winner of the 2004 AASL** National School Library Media Program of the Year Award for a Large District. This award is considered to be the library equivalent of the Academy Awards. It is particularly noteworthy that Northside received this award while simultaneously enduring budget cuts and some understaffed libraries. By means of staff development seminars and administrative workshops, the District's library personnel have managed to convey information to teachers about the numerous possibilities for using a modern school library.

One of these possibilities pertains to participation in the Greater San Antonio Quilt Guild community outreach project: "Storybooks And Quilts To Go." Cathy Fielding, librarian at Monroe May Elementary School, used her experience with the quilt project to prepare a learning

station for some of the ALA attendees. She chose three books and their corresponding quilts to represent the program; The Keeping Quilt, The Quilt, and The Josefina Story Quilt. She included a sample of a log book that accompanies each quilt and handouts about the program's origins in San Antonio. Ms. Fielding included in her display some photos of the quilts being used by librarians in the Northside District and copies of curricular involvement activities.

She explained how the quilts are delivered by the Guild committee and how they are distributed among the librarians. She took care to explain the importance of the log books in keeping track of the numbers of children exposed to the quilts and how the logs books bring back suggestions and comments to the Guild. Many of her listeners were amazed at how many children had seen the books and quilts: 12,199 students throughout San Antonio in 2005 Fall semester. Several of the librarians had books in mind which they thought would be perfect for a quilt.

Ms. Fielding emphasized that children were allowed - even encouraged - to touch the quilts (with clean hands!). This simple statement elicited warm approval from the elementary school librarians who know children are so very tactile.

Just how does the Storybooks And Quilts To Go program fit into a school's curriculum? An imaginative teacher can find several ways to use the Storybooks And Quilts To Go. First, of course, are the storybooks themselves. Children develop their listening skills and discuss story elements during story time. They also learn to appreciate reading, and when the quilts are presented the story is reinforced. New concepts are learned from the quilts themselves. Ms. Fielding (pictured below) says she has seen four-year olds that have been shown a seam in a quilt and days later the children are still pointing out seams on skirts and blue jeans, absolutely excited by their new knowledge.


The older the children are, the more possibilities the storybooks and quilts present. Many teachers use the quilts as writing and discussion prompts. For example:

- What is an heirloom? Tell of your family's heirlooms.
- Quilts tell a story. Using pictures and words tell us four things about yourself. These drawings are then put together to make a class (paper) quilt.
- The Keeping Quilt is about Jewish holidays. Write about the traditions of a different culture.
- Quilts often use geometric shapes. Where else can you find these shapes?

During its Pioneer Days the teachers at Oak Hills Terrace Elementary School use the quilts to get children thinking about how basic needs were met in earlier days.

Ms. Fielding's presentation ignited a desire among many

of the ALA members to seek out quilt groups in their own areas and develop a similar program. Perhaps some day every district will be involved in a Storybooks And Quilts To Go project. Wouldn't that be wonderful!







We had two great workshops and an interesting lecture from Karen Eckmeier in February. All those who attended her workshops were high in praise of her skill and techniques. As an aside, Karen enjoyed our sunny Texas weather a little longer than she planned. Her scheduled Sunday morning flight back to Connecticut was cancelled because of the tremendous snow storm which hit the northeast. She didn't get to leave San Antonio until Tuesday morning. Our extra thanks to Barbara Wofford, her hostess, for entertaining her an extra two days!

Tips and Hints

- After drawing or tracing a pattern onto clear template plastic, it can be hard to see the lines to cut out the shape. Put masking tape on the wrong side of the plastic over the lines. The contrast allows you to clearly see the cutting lines. Remove the masking tape when you finish cutting so you won't have sticky residue on your new template.
- Protect the tips of your good scissors by covering them with a short length of 1/4" tubing (like that used with drip irrigation systems).
- After you've cleaned your sewing machine, put a couple drops of sewing machine oil on a Q-tip and go over the nooks and crannies again. You'll be amazed at the amount of "stuff" that was left behind.
- Pre-washing small pieces of fabric (like for your \$5 block)? Instead of the washing machine, use your salad spinner. You can wash, rinse and spin with very little fraying.


> your local hospital for the first baby born on National Quilting Day."


