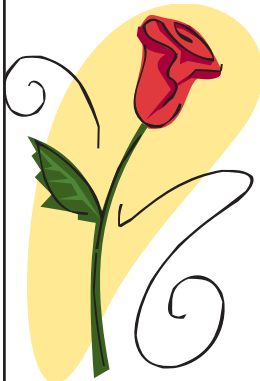

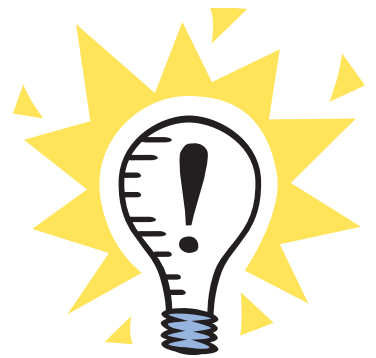

President: Sunshine and Shadows had no report. Chairperson should contact president once a month and committees should contact Chair not the president.

Directories and Newsletters: Dea Jae will have lists out for the next meeting so members can make corrections to their contact information prior to printing new directories for 2007. All members must have dues paid prior to printing so their name can be included and they can receive the newsletter. Webpage must be renewed by Jan. 17th and will cost \$251.35 for one year.

Programs: Larry stated he had 18 entries for the Ugliest Quilt contest and 1st, 2nd, and 3rd places will receive prizes. Members will vote by ballot at the meeting.

Jane Tenorio Coscarelli will come for our Feb. program. She has authored Tortilla Quilt, Cascarones etc. While she is here she will visit several area schools Wednesday and Thursday February 7th and 8th.

Services: No report from Bernie.

Community Outreach: Barbara stated she received a call from Kay Allison saying more volunteers at ITC to do hand quilting. Barbara Gilstad is giving up her Chair in Feb. and thinks a librarian would be the best replacement if we can find one.

Jean Powell will be checking with Youth Alternatives to make sure that what they are getting from us is something they can use.

Of volunteer hours reported we had 3594 hours on the books for 2006.

Treasurer: Preliminary amounts for December were reported and are subject to change: Operating Account \$3109.25, Savings Account \$32,980.45, CD \$20,000 and preliminary total \$56,089.79. Karen is getting papers and signatures together so that the additional CD we had voted on can be purchased. Karen will transfer \$3000. from savings to cover operating costs till money from vendors start to come in.

Ruth Felty will be dropped as authorized signer on bank accounts.

Bobbie Ashley will be added as an authorized

signer on bank accounts. Lois Beauchamp and Karen Nanos will continue as authorized signers on bank accounts.

The Board authorizes Karen Nanos and Lois Beauchamp as signers to purchase CD in the amount of \$15,000. The Board authorizes the purchase of a CD in the amount of \$15,000.

We talked about how we can increase our income and participation in programs.

Parliamentarian: Motion was made and seconded to keep Sandy Mehall as parliamentarian. Motion passed. Sandy will be looking at our Standing Rules and By-Laws in the coming months for updates, corrections, additions, and deletions.

President Pro Tem: Lois wants an accounting of all storage room keys and limited access will be practiced. Members entering the storage room must sign a logbook. The quilts in the storeroom must be aired out and then determine which ones are to be kept and guide-lines to be presented next business meeting. Magazines, Bernie is going to get with Mary Ruth Flores and give her a definite time frame to work with. Look into a device that hangs from the ceiling holds rolled quilts to minimize storage space. Look at videos and patterns as we do with magazines and trim down inventory.

Quilt Show: Mary turned in her report. We may be looking into alternate location for future Shows enabling us to increase number of vendors.

Unfinished Business: Discussion continues regarding the storage room.

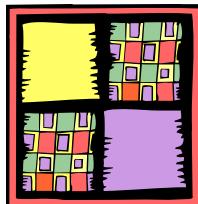
New Business: Sherry Allred's suggestions regarding archives were visited. Lori will work with Sherry and research viable options.

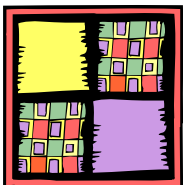

MISSION

The Greater San Antonio Quilt Guild has established a grant program in honor of a loved and esteemed founding member, Ethel Y. Howey, whose accomplishments and influence extended into the international quilt world. The grant is to encourage the pursuit of education in the study of quilt making and to recognize the importance of quilting in today's society as an art form, as an instrument of healing, as part of our legacy, and as a common thread which binds all in friendship.

PURPOSE

The purpose of the grant program is to fund projects that will have long term impact on preserving the heritage and further the art of quilt making. The grant may be used to cover expenses such as fees (including conferences, workshops, etc.), travel, lodging, meals, materials and books. The grant(s) will be awarded annually, not to exceed \$1000.

ELIGIBILITY

Applicant must be an active GSAQG member in good standing for the previous two (2) years immediately preceding the grant deadline.

An applicant must show evidence of an interest in continuing to improve and innovate in the field of quilt design, construction, history or technique.

Financial need will not be a criterion for selection.

Recipients must be willing and able to share with GSAQG the new skills, techniques, or information gained. This may be in the form of a presentation, a workshop or other process that disseminates the information to the members.

Recipient must submit in writing a final report of the project and expenses by March 1 of the following year. If recipient fails to fulfill requirements any advanced funds must be returned. Grant recipients are ineligible to reapply for grants for three years. Grant committee members are ineligible for grants while serving on the committee.

PROCEDURES AND DEADLINES

Applications must be submitted on or before November 1 (current year), and the grant will be awarded at the following January guild meeting. The grant recipient's final report is due by March 1 of the year **after** the grant is awarded.

If the grantee is unable to attend the proposed project or program, the grant money must be returned within three (3) months of the cancellation, or on a time-line agreed to by the committee and the applicant. If an alternate applicant is available, the money may be transferred to the alternate with approval of the committee.

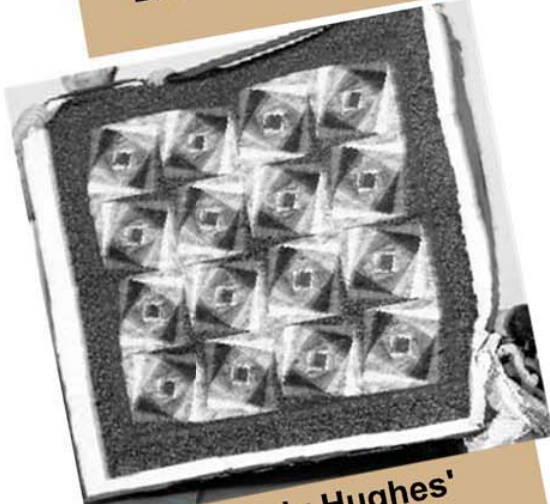

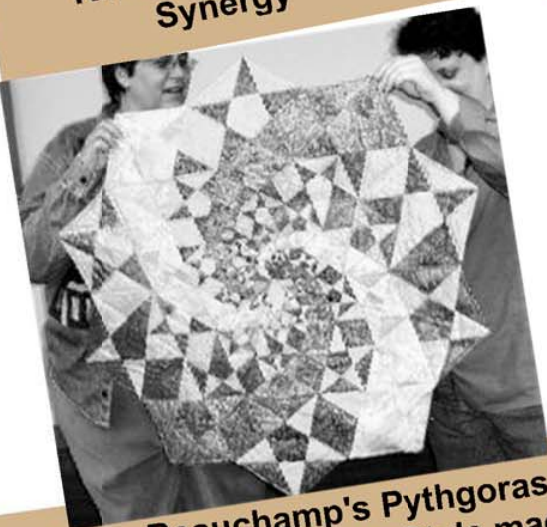

PECAN PIE WITH KAHLUA AND CHOCOLATE CHIPS

A sinfully rich dessert that's amazingly easy to prepare. You will have thought you died and gone to heaven.

— ingredients —

- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup (1/2 stick) unsalted butter, room temperature
- 1 tablespoon all purpose flour
- 3/4 cup dark corn syrup
- 1/4 cup Kahlúa or other coffee liqueur
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 3 large eggs
- 1 cup chopped pecans
- 1/2 cup semisweet chocolate chips
- 1 purchased frozen deep-dish 9-inch pie crust
- 2/3 cup chilled whipping cream
- Pecan halves (optional)

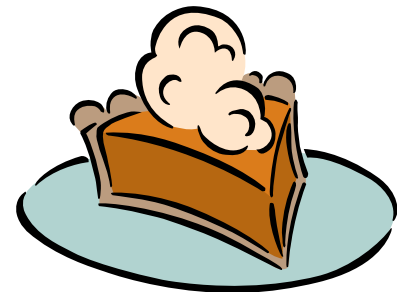
— preparation —

Preheat oven to 375°F. Beat sugar and butter in medium bowl until smooth; beat in flour. Gradually beat in corn syrup, then Kahlúa and vanilla. Mix in eggs, then chopped pecans. Sprinkle chocolate chips over bottom of crust. Pour filling into crust.

Bake pie until filling is puffed around edges and just set in center, covering edge of crust if browning too quickly, about 45 minutes. Transfer pie to rack and cool completely. (Can be prepared 1 day ahead. Cover and refrigerate.)

Beat cream in medium bowl until peaks form. Drop whipped cream in small dollops around edge of pie. Place pecan half atop each dollop, if desired.

Serves 8 to 10.

Center for American History announces *Put a Roof Over Our Head* quilt exhibit

The Center for American History at The University of Texas at Austin announces the February 5 opening of a new quilt exhibit, *Put a Roof Over Our Head*, at the Winedale historic complex. The exhibit, courtesy of the Alliance for American Quilts, consists of 74 house-shaped quilts created by quilt makers from across the U.S. and three other countries to celebrate the Alliance's move to its new headquarters in Asheville, North Carolina. The exhibit will be displayed until March 17, with portions of the exhibit divided among the Center's three museums: Winedale, near Round Top, Texas; the Sam Rayburn Library and Museum in Bonham, Texas; and the John Nance Garner Museum in Uvalde, Texas.

"The exhibit is a prime example of the close partnership between the Center for American History and the Alliance for American Quilts. Together, we're working to acquire, document, preserve, and present information about quilts and quilt history," said Center Assistant Director Brenda Gunn. "The nonprofit Alliance for American Quilts is a network of scholars, curators, quilt artists, librarians, archivists, and others from around the country dedicated to recognizing quilts as works of art and as pieces of history with stories to be documented and preserved. We are honored that our Winedale Center for the Quilt is one of three regional centers with which the Alliance has formalized partnership arrangements."

The Winedale Center for the Quilt and the Alliance are also collaborating on *The Quilt Index*, a centralized, online repository of photographs and information about quilts in public and private collections (<http://www.quiltindex.org>). By late 2007, the Index is expected to include more than 15,000 photographs and records.

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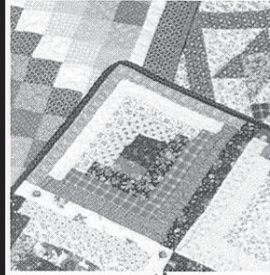
- Come March, we will be relocating to our new location at Bandera and Mainland!

- In the meantime, we have plenty of new fabrics, patterns, projects and block of the month programs to keep you creating. Come by and see all we have to offer this year.

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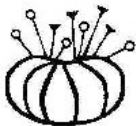
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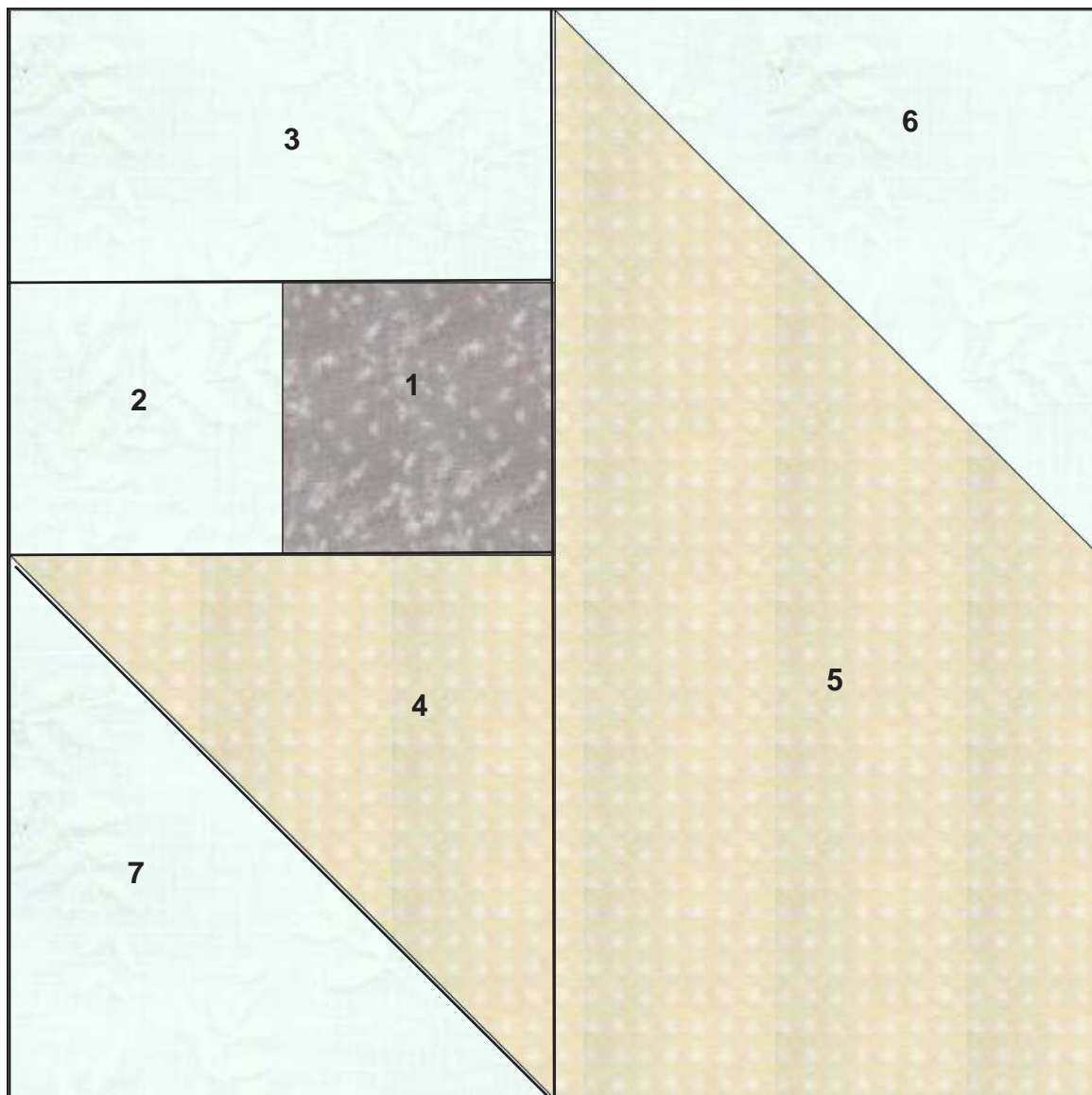
