
Donation

The Board welcomes Nechia Dawson as our new 3rd V.P. – Programs, Gail Daniel 1st V.P. – Special Events, and a changing of hats for Larry Beauchamp as President Pro-Tem.

A Rose Bud award was given to Kris Thomson for her wonderful work chairing the Winter Retreat. Judith miller will receive a Rose



Bud for the fantastic Christmas Party and Gundy Cleven will also get a Rose Bud for her tireless job chairing the Community Response Committee.

Barbara Wolford presented an Ethel Howey grant of \$700.00 to Ida Tyson Blankenship. She will be using it to take a class with Karen Stone called "Creative Ideas" at the Kerrville Retreat in March. She wants to get creative ideas for her kaleidoscope design for the 2009 Quilt Show; and a \$300.00 grant to Ellen Hernandez who will use it to attend an "Alliance For American Quilts" seminar.

Thomson announced that the Winter Retreat was a BIG success, and announced the dates for next Winter Retreat will be a 3 or 4 day retreat. The dates will be Jan. 30 – Feb. 2, 2009 and it will be the quilters' choice whether they stay 3 days or 4 days. More details to follow.

<u>5th Vice-President – Community Outreach</u>: Barbara Sumlin reported that Dusty Sherrill was a member of the "Scraps for Life" bee. This bee has made 671 quilts and 50 Bears that have been to SW Mental Health Center, Fisher House, Homeless, and Casa.

Kay Allison reported that the ½ Square Triangle Quilt from QPC was in the frame at The Institute of Texan Cultures and was just about finished and this quilt will be donated to the Quilt Auction. ITC Docent training will be on Jan. 16th but they will have other dates throughout the year.

Sandra Retzloff stated that she still needed volunteers for the Pro-Show Jan. 17th – Jan. 19th.

Donnis Todd reported that Carol Rouse will be teaching "Drunkkard's Path" this Saturday at the Greater Northwest Library. In February Charlotte Keener will teach Borders and Sashings, Kolodzie Harper will teach hand quilting in March and Charlotte Keener will teach Bindings and Tricks of the Trade in April.

<u>Treasurer</u>: Karen Nanos reported: Savings Account: \$15,118.11 Operating Account: \$16,642.64 CD: \$20,000.00, CD: \$15,000.00 Total Guild Funds: \$66,760.75.

New Business:

Fat Quarter Exchange

Bring fat quarters and put your name in the basket for each one you bring. Win a group of fat quarters at the drawing. The color for February is teal, turquoise, blue-green -whatever you might call it.

Documenting Your Quilt

You finished your latest quilt. The hand quilting is the best you've ever done and the binding lays flat and smooth. You even added a label on the back complete with your name, date finished, where you live, and why you made the quilt. Finally! You're all done! Well, not quite. You should still document your quilt.

List the name of the quilt, the name of the maker, date finished and place made. Give the size of the quilt and a detailed, written description. The description might tell the number of blocks used, the names of the blocks, sources you used, the



story behind the quilt, and how long it took to make the quilt (a favorite question from nonquilters).

It is nice to include a short biography about the quilter. Then, take several good pictures of the quilt, both the front and back, and put them in too. If the quilt is an original design, this is a good place to archive your sketches and pattern pieces.

Including some leftover scraps of fabric is a good idea. These scraps could serve several purposes. First, they provide a comparison to help you keep track of any fading. This can alert you to the need to move your quilt away from strong lighting or other conditions that can damage it. The scraps could be used to help identify your quilt if that was ever necessary.

Take time to record the names and dates of any shows that this quilt was displayed in, along with any awards the quilt wins. I find it easiest to write this information on the outside of each folder as each event occurs. If the show had a program, put that in your folder too, with the name of your quilt bookmarked. I like to take a picture of the quilt as it was displayed at the show, especially if the quilt won a ribbon.

That really applies to the projects that the Quilt Projects Committee puts together. The purpose of these kits is to encourage you to try new techniques or to practice and perfect what you know.

Just think how much you would learn by planning a project, writing the directions, and making the test block. When it is finished, you would be an expert on that technique or would have decided that you really don't like that method. Either way you would have expanded your knowledge and skills.

The challenge: if you have a technique or pattern that you've wanted to try, why not do it as a QPC project. We have fabric available and funds to get specific pieces. We will work with you to plan the kits and write the directions. We just ask that you be willing to honcho the project to completion.

Get involved — you'd be amazed what you'll learn and how much fun and satisfaction you'll get from the experience.



Some people say there are no such things as mistakes, they are just "design opportunities". In this lecture Amy will show examples of quilts which were going wrong, and how they were rescued.



- 5. Creating a new focal point
- 6. Combining two designs which were not working, to create one which will work
- 7. Adding extensive embellishments- "Addition and Distraction"
- 8. Anything else we can think of!





Witte Museum Exhibit





<u>Moda Mystery Quilt</u> – This quilt, also running 12 months, is appliqued and pieced in purples, yellows, blues and greens. Some of the blocks will have baskets of flowers. The rest is a mystery that gets revealed over the year.

Garden Friends and Kindred Spirits – These two BOMs both use the sunflower line from EE Schenck, Full Sun. Garden Friends has pieced and appliqued birdhouses, birds, honeybees and flowers. Kindred Spirits has pieced blocks surronding a large center block. Both BOMs run 6 months.


