4.2021 Pieces of the Past, 132: Eleanor Beard, by Ellen Hernandez



Eleanor Beard lived in the small Western Kentucky town of Hardinsburg during the 1920s. Her husband, Marvin, was a farmer. In only a few years Eleanor started a nationally recognized quilt company, the Eleanor Beard Studio, that employed over 1,000 people and serviced clients in her offices of New York, Chicago, and Pasadena.

The Depression was especially difficult for the survival of small towns, including Hardinsburg. Eleanor's husband raised sheep for wool. He also accepted wool as payment for goods from his general store on Main Street. Eleanor used the wool for

batting and sold her

originally designed hand quilted silk quilt. After that success, she hired women to make more quilted items, many working from home so that they could tend their homes and children. Besides quilts with straight or scalloped edges which sold for \$20, she had other 'boudoir' items – lingerie bags, robes, bed jackets, pillows, and baby jackets and hats. The patterns were quilted in whole cloth style. Some were corded or stuffed using a machine that blew fibers into the quilted channels. Fabrics included satin, sateen, taffeta, and crepe de Chine. Hollywood stars were fans of Eleanor's products and movie bedroom sets often featured her beautiful quilts.











Appliqued quilts and a variety of home goods such as this elephant pin cushion were also made by Eleanor's company.

The US Dept of Labor filed a lawsuit against Eleanor in

1942 citing low wages for the work done by the women quilters. Labor lost on the basis that the homeworkers were independent contractors rather than employees and not subject to the Fair Labor Standards Acts of 1938.

Eleanor's daughter, Barbara Castleman took over the business in 1951 and later in 2002 Jane Hodges of Leontine Linens in New Orleans, bought the Eleanor Beard Studios. They are still producing monogramed hand stitched whole cloth satin quilts in a variety of colors using Eleanor's patterns. Prices vary but a recent twin quilt was listed at \$1,650.
